

# President's Note

Come to NUNA's October General Meeting on Monday, October 2. Important stuff to be heard and talked about.

First, former Austin City Councilmember and Texas State Representative (Dist. 46) Sheryl Cole will speak at the October meeting. I hope you will attend. It is a rare chance to hear first hand from someone who has served in both of these offices and who can give us some insights about some of the more "interesting" things going on in the halls of officialdom.

Good news! The Zilker Park plan that the Austin City Council was on the verge of passing has been deep sixed. The plan called for a 5,000 seat ampitheater for commercial entertainment to be built on the Great Lawn plus three parking garages in the park.

Bad news! Councilmember Leslie Pool has put forth a resolution to cleave 176,000 residential lots into smaller parcels (down to 2,500 s/f) and allow multiple residential units to be built on each. Property owners will then be taxed on this new "highest use" value of their property. And then there's a move to allow RVs to be parked in driveways and rented out as a dwelling unit.

Odd news! The endless parade of the Cruise autonomous taxis in training that paraded endlessly through North University, West Campus, and elsewhere throughout the summer seems to have abated somewhat.

Hot news! No small number of NUNA-ites beat the heat by heading off to cooler climes and are beginning to return home now that it is more likely to be 99 and not 109. The squirrels are not wasting any time preparing for winter - half-eaten pecans and broken acorns are covering the sidewalks.

# BA BA BAD TO THE ZONE

Councilmember Leslie Pool and the City Council want to carve up 176,000 Single Family residential lots in Austin to make "small lots" for multiple housing units.

# Is one of these lots yours?

Councilmember Pool's proposal directs city staff to draft code amendments that would convert single-family zoning into multi-family zoning all over Austin.

If CM Pool and the City Council are successful, Austin will become the only large city in Texas to broadly eliminate existing single-family neighborhood zoning.

Under the Pool resolution, a 7,500-square-foot lot could be subdivided into three lots, each with three units, for a total of nine units in taller buildings that can be closer to adjoining homes and the street.

These new land use regulations will apply to all existing housing with SF-1, SF-2, SF-3, and SF-4A/4B.

This action would open up single family areas to small lot multi-family residential development everywhere.

In the first wave, over 176,000 lots would be cut into smaller parcels. You will not be notified before it appears next door.

If the resolution goes through, it will authorize developers to re-subdivide existing single-family lots into parcels of 2,500 square feet (or less). And it will allow three dwelling units on these smaller lots.

The proposed density of 3 units on a 2,500square-foot lot is around 52 units per acre, just below the limit for MF-5 High-Density Zoning. Properties in the Lake Austin and Rural Residential zoning districts have a minimum lot size of one acre. They are exempted from the division plan.

PUDs (Planned Unit Developments) are also exempted.

Austin already has far less land zoned for single-familyonly housing (one house on a lot) than many US cities. This is because SF-3 "single-family" zoning in Austin already allows a home and ADU, or a duplex.

This extreme proposal by the Austin City Council will destabilize existing neighborhoods and promote incompatible development.

The City Council adopted Pool's resolution this summer, but this has not yet been adopted as a code amendment.

There is still an opportunity to safeguard our neighborhoods from Council-driven redevelopment. But not much time. D9's Council rep is Zo Qadri. 512-978-2109

# North University Neighborhood VS The Autonomous Taxi

All summer from 8:30 p.m. to 5:30 a.m., North University was overrun with small cars with cute names and no driver moving in endless loops through the neighborhood. # **ZILKER PARK VISION PLAN SHELVED**

(Whew! That was a close call.)



Public response was vociferous and immediate.

Some 300 people showed up at the June Parks Board meeting to speak passionately against corporatizing Zilker Park. But despite the reasoned arguments and environmental and hydrological logic on display, the Parks Board voted against the citizens and against Zilker and for a plan that would monetize a natural treasure through ticket sales and large commercial corporate-sponsored events. Zilker's fate - should it remain a park for the people? or would it become a vehicle of corporate profit? - was slated to be voted on by the City Council on August 31.

Save Zilker Park signs sprouted all over Austin. Save Zilker Park T-shirts appeared on bodies all over town. And filmmaker Steve Mims made Zilker, Inc. - The Plan to Monetize a National Treasure.

Zilker, Inc. premiered to a packed house at The Linc. Designworkshop, which had received \$600,000 for its part in creating the Zilker Park Plan, immediately complained to YouTube that a couple of screenshots of their website in the film violated copyright. YouTube

Then out of the blue, the Watson Wire hit. Mayor Kirk Watson didn't mince words. He said:

The Zilker Metropolitan Park Vision Plan will not be on the August 31st City Council agenda, and there is no plan to bring it before the Austin Mayor and Council in the future. ... I'm grateful the Interim City Manager has stopped this process.

Then three council members made a joint statement. Ryan Alter (Dist. 5), Mayor Pro Tem Paige Ellis (Dist. 8), and Zo Qadri (Dist. 9) stated:

As City Council Members, we play a critical role as stewards of Zilker Park... We know the challenges Zilker Park is facing will not go away on their own, but we do not see a path forward for the Zilker Vision Plan and therefore cannot support it.

It is a good thing that our elected representatives have spoken for Zilker Park and against giving over Austin's jewel in the pursuit of corporate gain. But is the Plan gone for good? Who knows. Money never sleeps.

# TRASH JA\_\_ LO23

It's time for the more-or-less annual reminder about trash management in the neighborhood. We all see the piles of trash left by dumpsters that are already overflowing. One interesting thing this fall is that there actually seems to be fewer overflowing dumpsters and recycling carts at many of the apartment complexes these days and a lot less furniture set out at the curb. Several people have commented that they have noticed the same thing. Usually the big move out and move in months of June and August generate mountains of garbage bags and old couches, but this year was much tamer trashwise.

But nevertheless, trash, recycling, and compost must be taken out and picked up, and we all want to do our part and do it properly. So here are a few facts and figures and reminders.

North University's weekly trash and compost collection and twice-monthly recycling takes place on Fridays unless a holiday or weather event slides it down a day or so. Our garbage carts should be at the curb or in the alley by 5:30 a.m. The empty carts should be moved into your yard the same day.

The big blue recycling bins are only for mixed paper, plastic, metal, glass, and cardboard boxes, which should be broken down for a better fit in the carts.

THE WRITE STUFF OR WRITE STUFF

Fire up that old Remington. Dig up that vintage Underwood. Make friends with that Commodore Amiga in the closet. Or just sharpen a pencil or dip a feather into the inkwell and write something for the NUNA newsletter.

Please DO NOT put your recyclables in the bin in plastic bags. The bags tangle the sorters at the recycling center and can shut the process down while the machines are cleaned. Also, put food waste and other compostables in the smaller green carts, not in the recycling bins — it contaminates the recyclables and causes whole loads to be rejected for recycling. The green compost are serviced every Friday.

Twice a year, Austin's Resource Recovery announces a special pickup of large items. This is usually in August and February for curbside customers. Items for Bulk Collection must be placed on the curb, not in the alley.. Items that will be picked up during Bulk Collecting include metal items, appliances, tires, furniture, and mattresses. Appliance doors must be removed for safety reasons. Bulk Collection will not pick up brush, branches, sheet glass, construction debris, cardboard boxes, truck tires, auto parts, paints, or chemicals. You can find a full list of what can be put out at austintexas.gov/bulk. Special brush pickup dates will be announced a couple of times during the year.

Leftover paint, chemicals, cooking oil, and other hazardous materials can be dropped off by appointment at the Recycle & Reuse Drop-off Center at 2514 Business Center Drive, 78744. Appointments can be scheduled online at austintexas.gov/dropoff or by calling 512-974-4343 (according to the current website).

Make sure to keep the cart lids closed all times to keep out rodents, raccoons, possums, flies, and mosquitoes. While you're at it, check for standing water elsewhere too since we just had a bit of rain — the mosquitoes will waste no time feeding and laying their eggs.

And always, before you send something into the trash or recycling, consider if it could be reused or repurposed. Austin Creative Reuse at 2005 Wheless Lane, 78723, takes in all sorts of odd items that still have some life in them and sells them for very reasonable prices. Teachers love this place, and you wouldn't believe what you can find and what clever and creative neighbor you might run into there dropping things off or leaving with an armload of materials for some creative project or other. And of course, Goodwill and other local thrift and resale stores are ready to take furniture, clothes, household items, and other things that can be resold.

# AN UPDATE ON PROPOSED DESIGNS THROUGH THE EYES OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Adams/Hemphill Park Advisory Committee met (for the last time) on September 7, Thursday, 2023.

The meeting was convened by Zach Jarjoura. With 17 participants, city staff out numbered (4-1) the 4 NUNA representatives: Mark Feist, Madeline Maxwell, Mary Ingle, and Miranda Grieder.

John Middleton, the senior engineer from the Watershed Protection Department, started off the meeting with an explanation of the storm drain between East and West Drives. He reported that the City Arborist has determined that the mesquite tree near the sewing set is in bad shape, and it most likely will be removed.

To give you some idea about what might be in a survey later in October and early November for residents, two design plans were presented. This is a rough description about what might be included in each plan:

Plan 1 had ten benches or "seating opportunities, nine picnic tables, a rock climbing wall, two more swing sets and playscape, and a basketball court. A gate and a bridge to the park were included in the drawing.

Plan 2 had nine benches or "seating opportunities," four picnic tables, one additional swing set and one play structure in a designated area, no bridge option from East and West drives, a reduced footprint of pavement, and a basketball court. This plan included half the lighting of Plan 1.

A pollinator-garden was mentioned, with cooperative maintenance with the Parks Department and Watershed Protection. It is important to find out who is responsible for maintenance, since continued maintenance of Hemphill Park creek bed has always been a challenge for timely upkeep!

These two plans were presented in tandem with the dry basin which will be installed in the park for drainage purposes.

The next step will be a public survey and virtual meeting to be held at the end of October or beginning of November 2023. The meeting will be open to the public. It is important to participate in this meeting if you are at all interested in the park "improvements." Supposedly, residents will have the opportunity to weigh in on elements in the plans or a combination of elements, or suggestions for removal of improvements.

Construction of the park improvements is slated to take 10 months (plus hydrolics, which could take longer). The final design is targeted for March/April 2024. There will be some lag time to secure a contractor for the project, but the park improvements are said to be completed in 2026.

During the presentations, there were many questions from the participants. The questions ranged from night sky concerns over the lighting in the park to the bridge at the fire station on 30th Street which is not in the best shape (who will repair that bridge?). Even the concept of "less is more" for the design of the park was uttered.

With your collective input to these two plans, the improvements suggested for this park project should render a better plan."Light bulb!" Participate!
