# NUNA TO VOTE ON BOYCOTT OF H.E.B.

AFTER YEARS OF NEGOTIATION OVER THE DEVELOPMENT OF SURPLUS PROPERTY AT THE AUSTIN STATE HOSPITAL, THE STEERING COMMITTEE OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION HAS DECIDED TO ASK THE MEMBERSHIP TO CONSIDER A BOYCOTT OF H.E.B. AND THE OTHER RETAILERS IN THE CENTRAL PARK SHOPPING CENTER NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION ALONG LAMAR JUST NORTH OF 38TH STREET. NUNA HAS BEEN INVOLVED WITH THE PLANNING OF THIS PROJECT SINCE 1988, BUT AGREEMENTS WORKED OUT WITH THE TEXAS GENERAL LAND OFFICE AND THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH AND MENTAL RETARDATION HAVE ONLY BEEN IGNORED. THE BOYCOTT PROPOSITION AS WELL AS PLANS TO CARRY IT OUT WILL BE VOTED ON AT THE JUNE 7TH NEIGHBORHOOD MEETING. YOUR COMMENTS ON THIS MATTER ARE WELCOME--CONTACT ANY NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION OFFICER FOR MORE INFORMATION -- AND YOUR PRESENCE AT THE JUNE NEIGHBORHOOD MEETING IS KEY--PLEASE MAKE PLANS TO ATTEND.

## Report on Light Rail Planning

It is still in the cards for the Capital Metro Board of Directors to make a decision on when to hold a bond election for the Light Rail Project at their June meeting. However, there is increasing indications that instead of being held this November, the election will not be held until at least the spring of 1994. However, there has still been progress during the last month. The latest community planning program was concluded and a number of draft financial and technical reports were released. This work will be reviewed and finalized by the Board by July. Looking past the election decision in June, the federal draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) will hopefully be released in October and following that there will be public input on the so called Locally Preferred Alternative for the project. This process will ultimately decide in the form of a final version of the EIS what transit option to pursue with respect to Light Rail: a 'no build' option, an expanded bus system, or the 'Starter Line' project of a city wide Light Rail System along with reconfiguration of the existing bus system.

The strategy of the neighborhood association continues to be one of monitoring this process, but things are gearing up for more involvement. Discussion is planned at the June Neighborhood Meeting and could lead to taking a position on the project later this year in conjunction with the EIS process. The neighborhood association continues to amass a lot of information on the project and the many complex issues it involves-available at Neighborhood Meetings and in future newsletters--and will need to continue to do so. Participation in the community planning workshops was generally successful. As the final report on this effort is prepared by Capital Metro staff and consultants, most of the concerns that can be advanced about the project at this stage have been. There are some shortcomings-complete opposition to the project or the Guadalupe alignment was out of order--but a strong foundation to protect neighborhood interests is in place if the project is approved and formal planning begins under Federal Transit Administration guidelines.

Finally, circumstances in just the past few weeks--public and private statements from Board members, and some hints from the political landscape--prove that the Light Rail Project is fragile and is by no means a 'done deal'. Board action in the next two months will be especially telling and by the next newsletter more should be known about the EIS process and the possibility of other planning activities to be held during the fall.


# Neighborhood Crime Report

Owing to delays in receiving several reports for last year and a lack of space in April's newsletter, the final report for 1992 has just now been put together. What a shock! Excluding public intoxication, criminal mischief, and a few other miscellaneous offenses, there were 445 reported crimes within the boundaries of our neighborhood last year. A quick glance at the printout revealed few if any arrests and the numbers confirmed it: 26 total arrests, occurring in only about 6% of the reported incidents. Obviously, more prevention is needed by all residents in our neighborhood, but so to is more action from APD. Whether this amount of crime is high or low compared other neighborhoods, the bottomline in the arrest rate is absymal. For the record (arrests associated with an incident appear in parenthese alongside):
